If you're using the Chrome browser and have the <u>extension</u> installed, when you're in a G Suite app like docs or sheets, up in the upper right-hand corner you'll see the "Rainbow Question Mark" icon. Just click on that to see short training videos about that app. Each video is 1-3 minutes and a great way to learn about features you haven't used before. Please give it a try!

Thinking of Flipping Your Classroom?



<u>Udemy</u>, the online training provider is now offering a course called "<u>Flipped Learning Certification: Level One</u>", the first of three planned courses on the subject. At \$70 (\$19 until 10/26), the course might be a good resource for someone thinking about flipping their classroom. The course has great ratings, 4.8/5.0, and the

comments from the participants are all very positive. It includes 9 units with about 6.5 hours of video and 9 quizzes. In looking at this course, I noticed there are other courses on Udemy that might be of interest including <u>Coding for Kids</u>, <u>Blended</u> <u>Learning</u>, and <u>Teaching with Technology</u>.

Short, Engaging Videos Boost Student Engagement



<u>Blended Learning research</u> by OpenEd, an ACT company, looked at the views of 500,000 videos by K-12 students. They found that older students tended to watch a greater percentage of the video. They found some videos that have engaging delivery are watched 50% longer than the less engaging delivery videos. They also compared

the completion of online quizzes among a variety of learning platforms and Google Classroom was the clear winner. Google Classroom users had higher rates of quiz assignment and quiz completion than other learning management systems.

The National Science and Technology Medals Foundation (NSTMF)'s website, "<u>The Lab</u>" has three activities for students to explore in the areas of gravity, sound and image processing. The gravity lab (shown at left) lets students create celestial bodies of varying sizes and flick them around to see how they interact. As things happen,

pop-ups explain how that situation works in real celestial bodies. It's a very engaging tool and provides an interesting way to look at how various bodies of different masses affect the orbits of other objects.
